

LOVE

A new commandment I give to you, that you love *one another*... (John 13:34)

- *Internal*: How was your week? Any new life updates? How was your walk with the Lord this week?
- *External*: Practically, is there any individual or family that needs encouragement from us as a group?

TRUTH

Let the word of God dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing *one another*... (Col. 3:16)

1. When you reflect on the message from Sunday, what most resonated with you?

2. Let's read our primary text. James identifies himself simply as "a servant of God and of the Lord Jesus Christ" (v. 1). What does this title suggest about his view of himself and his authority?
Calling himself a "servant" (bondservant) rather than "brother of Jesus" (which he was), shows us a glimpse of his humility. James' authority rests on being sent by God and Christ, not on family ties or personal status.
3. Verse 1 is addressed to "the twelve tribes in the Dispersion." Who exactly is James addressing and how do you think they would have received verse 2?
James was addressing Messianic Jews that were scattered from their homeland by Jews in Jerusalem. Likely facing persecution as a minority, their trials weren't trivial. James isn't offering a theory to comfortable people; he's speaking directly into real hardship.
4. James says to "count it all joy" when we meet trials (v. 2). Is joy the same thing as happiness here? How would you explain the difference to someone new to faith? To your kids?
No. Happiness is a reaction to circumstances; joy here is a settled confidence in what God is doing through circumstances. You can grieve a trial and still hold joy underneath it. The trial itself may be painful, but what it produces is worth valuing.
5. Why do you think James calls trials "various kinds" rather than naming specific examples? What kinds of trials are you facing right now?
"Various kinds" mean that it is not narrow. It applies to financial strain, illness, relational conflict, persecution, etc. God cares about the things that we care about (Psalm 34:18).
6. Verse 3 gives a reason for verse 2's command: "the testing of your faith produces steadfastness." How does knowing this reason change the way you might respond to a trial?
Knowing the purpose reframes the trial from senseless to purposeful. It doesn't remove the pain, but it gives a reason to endure rather than escape or resent it.
7. Verse 4 says to "let steadfastness have its full effect." What does it look like to let this process finish rather than cut it short?
It means not shortcutting the process, not looking for an easy way out, a quick fix, or numbing the discomfort, but staying in the trial long enough for it to accomplish its purpose.

8. The goal in verse 4 is to be "perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." What do you think James means by this. Is it about moral perfection, or something else?

Not sinless perfection, but maturity and wholeness, being fully formed in character, missing nothing essential to a mature faith. The Greek sense is closer to "complete" or "mature" than "flawless."

GREAT COMMISSION

Go therefore and make disciples of all nations... (Matt. 28:19-20)

- *Internal:* Did you make time to disciple your family this week? Pray with them?
- *External:* Is your life marked by joy/contentment? Are you prepared to share the gospel if the Holy Spirit prompted? Is the name of Jesus on your lips in your day-to-day activity?

CONFESSION/PRAYER/REPENTANCE

But exhort *one another* every day, as long as it is called "today," ... (Heb. 3:12-14)

- Confession is agreeing with God about our sin according to the Scriptures. Is there anything you want to confess before the group (generally)? [*apathy, idolatry, selfishness, jealousy, anger, envy*]
- Let's pray, asking God to help us apply His word to our lives.
